

Terms to apply:

- ★ Stereotype: a widely held but fixed and oversimplified image or idea of a particular type of person or thing.
- Assumption: a thing that is accepted as true or as certain to happen, without proof.
- ★ Bias: prejudice in favor of or against one thing, person, or group compared with another, usually in a way considered to be unfair.
- ★ Prejudice: preconceived opinion that is not based on reason or actual experience.

Question your source.



Identity Mind Map






